Have you ever been upset by something in the news? Maybe you heard about a terrible crime, or saw a picture of war, or watched a video about people who don't have clean water. Perhaps you heard about people who are being persecuted, punished, or put in prison for their faith. You may feel like there's no way you can help, but there is: you can pray for God's justice in the world.

There was a man in the Bible named Nehemiah who was upset by some news. When he heard that his people were in trouble, he got on his knees and prayed. He knew his people were not perfect and asked for God's mercy. He prayed for them to come back home to worship God.

Then, after he prayed, he went into action. He asked God to give him wisdom as a leader, and God had mercy on his people and helped them. Nehemiah relied on God to bring justice in his way, in his timing.
